

Excerpts from the IEEE citation style manual

The IEEE style commonly used in the field of computer science is a complex system. These notes are intended to help you only in RSS documents and presentations. If you are writing a more extensive document, please consult the IEEE website [B1].

In IEEE style, the reference citation is listed in the text in brackets [B1, B2, B3, etc]. “B” indicates a bibliographic source, and the numeral indicates whether it’s first, second, third, etc. If you refer to a source more than once in the text, that source is always listed the same way.

The reference citation occurs when the material you are citing is introduced. In the text, the citation comes in the middle of the sentence. In a graphic, the citation can come in the title or caption of the graphic.

A few examples:

Book:

Article:

Online source:
